




She's always got an excuse – I don't know what to believe!

- They are useful for predicting how you will do in the summer but...
 - They are just a snapshot of your performance in each subject at that point of the year
 - You need to **do something** with the information you get from your mocks

Year 11 Mock Exams (18/11/24 -29/11/2024)

Are mock exams all that important?



- Like learning to drive, mock exams will:
 - Give you feedback on your strengths and areas for development
 - Help your teachers identify the areas you need to practise
 - Allow you to get used to any access arrangements you may have
 - Give you a good experience of the real thing
 - Used as part of the evidence base in the event exams do not run (resilience measures)
- No one expects you to make <u>no</u> mistakes just that you do your best and keep trying!



Exams in Summer 2025



- These will start and finish in the normal window with exams taking place between Thursday 8th May 2025 and Wednesday 25th June 2025 (including contingency dates)
- These dates are provisional but are unlikely to change
- Grade boundaries for Summer 2025 are being set by the exam as normal and will be set in line with 2024 grade boundaries
- There is a proposal that formula sheets for maths, combined science and physics be allowed in exams again in Summer 2025. We are awaiting the results of a consultation that closed last week.

- 'Spreading wings' versus reality what's right for you?




- Apply to Sixth form and/or using your predicted grades by 24/01/25

- And finally- work hard!

Academic tracking

- Your son or daughter will be given their most recent set of Academic Tracking next week.
- This gives the best indication yet as to the grades that they are likely to achieve, if they continue as they are.
- It is made up from their exam performance at the end of year 10, as well as the start they have made to Year 11.
- Attitude to Learning Grade is still a key factor, are they engaged in class activities, home learning etc.
- Some students will need to continue as they are, some might need to change something that is not working, to maximise their potential, we have only 10 school days including tomorrow until the students are starting their Mock Exams.





Opportunities and sacrifices during the year

- Your child is likely to have a lot of 'plates' to keep spinning through the year, probably more than in previous years.
- School work, family time, time with friends, sporting activity, part time employment, computers/consoles/screen time...
- In order to maximise their potential, students will need to make some sacrifices through the year.
 - A lunchtime to check something they are not sure on.
 - A sports club for a few weeks to revise for Mocks.
 - Staying in a bit more for part of the weekend to revise.
- All students and their situations, timetables and commitments are different, but all will need to prepare, revise, practice etc. for their Mocks and Summer Exams.
- It is only normal to feel some pressure as we progress through Year 11, but students need to keep social and fun elements outside for school work, needs to be a balance.
- Any concerns with pressure etc that a student feels, speak to their tutor or myself so we can
 monitor and help if needed pastorally. Outside agencies including Dorset Minds and Kooth
 can help and be a good starting point for concerns with mental health.
- With school and home working together to support a student, and the students commitment and efforts, the student should experience success in the Summer Exams.





Subject Support Sessions

Revision/Support Sessions					
After school sessions are available on Wednesday (3.15-4.00pm in E2). Lots ofresources for revision & past papers is on teams.					
After school sessions are available on Monday Week <u>A</u> B55; After school Thurs Week B. Students welcome at lunchtime and after school at other times via agreement withtheir teacher.					
Support sessions for coursework are available on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday after school (3.15- 4.45pm in C5) After February half term there will be exam revision. Dates may change, a list will be posted on board in C5.					
There is an exam question compendium and textbook lending service available, as wellas a bespoke activity book.					
Support sessions are available on a Wednesday lunchtime and Wednesday after school.					
From February there will be an <u>after school</u> session on a Wednesday to support withthe NEA which will change to revision after the Easter Holiday					
Support sessions are available on a Tuesday lunchtime for all technology students and after school (3.15-4.45pm) if you are in Mr Laurijssen's or Mr Titterington's group and a Tuesday or Wednesday after school if you are in Mr Berry's group.					
Mrs Stanisstreet will be running a lunchtime revision session on either a Tuesday, Wednesday or Friday nearer to the exam (Date to be confirmed- around April/May). There will be after school and lunchtime rehearsal space provision prior to the Comp 2 performance exam. Y11 Drama students are always welcome to arrange a 1:1 with Mrs Stanisstreet if they are struggling in a specific area of the course.



Practice testing - Self-testing to check knowledge - especially using flash cards








Print off the specification and use it as a checklist when you revise - Ana

Start early and do as many practice papers as you can - Maisy

Use YouTube, it has great revision videos - Fleur

Make flashcards - Blessy

Use different approaches: flash cards, reading, past papers – find out what works for you.

Plan what you are doing and stick to it. Make your plan achievable and specific, not just "revise maths"

Find out what you're not sure about and then focus your revision on this - Jodie
